Our overall goal for AYIP is to offer the opportunity for Aboriginal Youth to gain more exposure of the economy they are in, work experience, and most of all, develop or find an interest for a long term career. This year, we partnered with 23 communities and organizations to employ over 100 youth within the region.

This year, to culminate our summer program, TESTS partnered with New Relationship Trust to host the "Don't Dream it... Be it!" youth conference in Prince Rupert. What a success! With over 80 students from around the region, we were able to offer the youth to network with their peers, learn about entrepreneurship and sponsorship opportunities and take part in competitions that challenged the youth to work as a team as well as enhance their personal and professional development. 





She also maintained a well-balanced life through athletics. Linsay was captain of her high school hockey team and is a traditional Fancy Dancer. Linsay completed her Bachelor's Degree in Child and Youth Care at Grant MacEwan University. During her fourth year of school she was chosen as a finalist for the show "Canada's Next Top Model". Not wanting to drop out of school, Linsay completed her final semester in two weeks. Linsay won the coveted first runner up prize on Canada's Next Top Model and made it home in time to attend her graduation. Upon completion of



University she started her own business Dreams In Motion Inc., a full service youth empowerment company designed to provide them with the tools needed to achieve their dreams. Linsay believes that we are all role models and therefore it is our duty to be the best that we can be.

Driginally from Tall Cree First Nation, James is a hip hop/cultural dancer who has taught, performed and travelled all across North America, Europe, and Australia. Trevor was a Radio Host for 2 years prior to joining the iCount High School, an alternative and holistic education program in his home community of Moricetown. In addition to culture, Trevor speaks on grief and trauma, mental health and First Nations social issues.

iefer Collison, born and raised on Haida Gwaii, is a Radio Host for the CFNR segment "Journeys". Mr. Collison has an extensive background in working with youth and is recognized as a role model in leadership.

Kiefer was very involved in the youth movement on Haida Gwaii where he utilized his position and took the opportunity to step into the political arena for the Council of the Haida Nation. He notes that one of the major accomplishments that he was proud of during his term was the creation of the "Haida Gwaii Youth Assembly", which you can find on YouTube.



Like so many Aboriginal youth, Kiefer found himself struggling with school, drugs and alcohol; he had no hope, no dreams and feeling like there was no future for him. Today, Mr. Collison has battled back to overcome those barriers and shares his story to inspire those who are walking similar paths that he once walked and says "... anything is possible and if you can dream it, you can do it.
